Most of us probably have a cache of stories or fond memories with Tom. Our Board agreed that, in the sincerest fashion, this newsletter would be an opportunity to share them and celebrate Tom.

As a man of stories, myself, I am drawn back 30 years ago to my first encounter with Tom and Martha. It was at a small country auction, and it was clear that these folks were new to the scene. Conversations were bountiful and a deeper sense of community was taking hold. We all began to belong, just a little bit more.

In true Tom fashion, there were no strangers. Everyone had a story. Conversations about art and food and travel and place and friendship were plentiful. It was one of the best chapters of my life.

As I get older and witness how life comes full circle, I am grateful that I had one more, final Tom chapter. I can remember standing on the front lawn of the Dwelling House at Alasa Farms waiting for a school bus tour of children when the phone rang, and it was Tom. “Hey Derek, how would you like to join the Sodus Bay Historical Society board?”

Thanks, Tom. Thanks for being a mentor, friend, making room at the table and letting me be part of your tribe. Sodus Bay Historical Society is even more special because of your artistic vision, your attention to detail and your strong ability to lead. You will forever be a valuable part of our history.

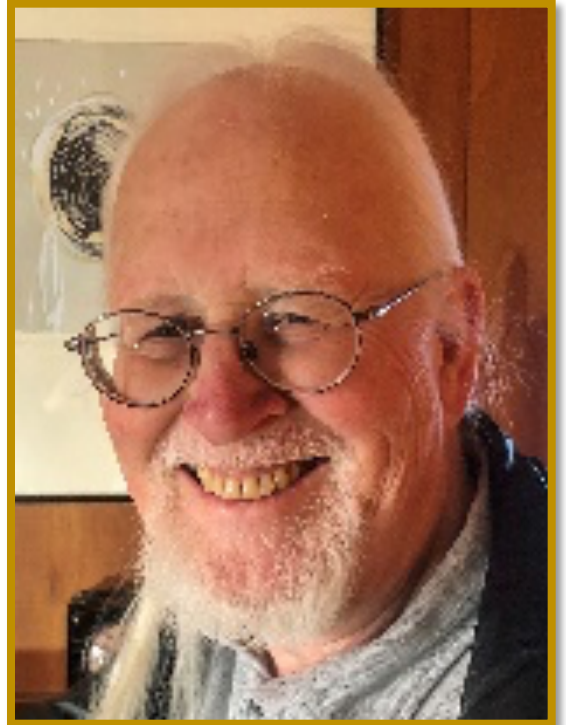


## Editor's Message

Though that application did not come to fruition, Tom's valiant efforts, and collaboration with others in the field laid the groundwork for a future application to secure Sodus Point this well-deserved distinction. As far as the Sodus Bay Lighthouse, it is clear to all, this was Tom's beloved passion. Tom spent many hours through many years dedicated to helping create an environment and character of place which so much contributed to the museum and organization's great success.

Tom's gentle, kind, thoughtful, and patient qualities will continue to benefit the Sodus Bay community, as we are all reminded to take gentle steps like Tom's and reach out to preserve those elements of our community we hold dear. Thank you, Tom, for everything!

# *Williamson Challenge Report*

**A**t our August annual meeting, David and Susan Williamson made an offer to match any member who donated \$1000 to the Sodus Bay Historical Society. A condition of the Williamsons' offer was that the monies be used for a specific identified purpose.

The SBHS board identified the most pressing need was repair of the lighthouse tower's windows. The situation is so bad that during rainstorms, the windows leak and water settles on the inside sills which causes them to rot. The window repair must be in accordance with our National Historical Society designation. Vinyl, aluminum, or wooden windows cannot be used. The existing windows must be **repaired** using the same type of material as the original windows. The cost for this project is estimated to be approximately \$18,000 which includes the rental of a bucket truck to facilitate repairs from the outside. Work on an historic building is more intricate and detail-oriented and must allow for consistency with the original structure, so we must find a professional familiar with this type of work



We are happy to report that twelve SBHS members contributed \$1000 each and the Williamsons matched that amount giving us \$24,000 to tackle this job. Any remaining money will be earmarked for additional lighthouse tower repairs.

The board wishes to thank those donors and David and Sue Williamson for their generosity.

The Landmark Society of Western NY recently presented Preservation Awards for exemplary work for ongoing preservation of historically significant buildings during a Zoom Awards Ceremony in December. Wayne County was strongly represented at the awards program. Local recipients were the Sodus Bay Lighthouse Museum, the Lyons Peppermint Museum, and Newark homeowners Matt Clingerman and Joe O'Toole. ## A Cool Place to Visit!

As Lake Ontario and Sodus Bay struggle to freeze and create an icy wonderland, and the frigid winds blow hard on shore, there is some pretty cool work going on inside the old lighthouse while it's "Closed for the Season".

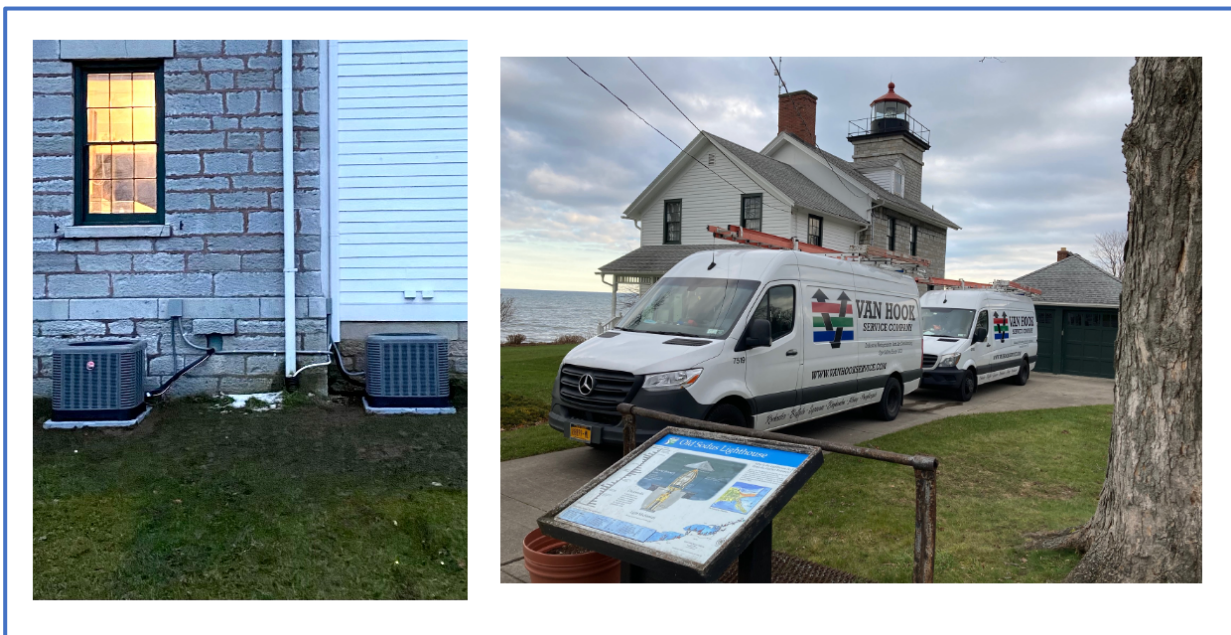
Identified in past museum assessments as a major improvement opportunity, controlling the museum's interior temperature and humidity fluctuations would be a significant benefit to preserving museum artifacts. In prior years, multiple window air conditioners and portable fans worked overtime to keep the sweltering interior temperature and humidity at tolerable levels.

Over a year ago, the SBHS Board of Trustees decided that it was a priority to try to address this problem and alleviate the potential damage to our artifacts and improve the comfort for our staff, volunteers, and visitors. As you can imagine, installing air conditioning and humidity control on three levels and thirteen rooms in a 150-year-old lighthouse built with two-foot-thick limestone walls and no existing ductwork would be a daunting challenge, and cost serious money.

But not to be deterred by degree of difficulty or lack of sufficient money, we proceeded. Grant opportunities were identified, and multiple grant applications were written. Qualified HVAC contractors were consulted, and multiple proposals and bids were obtained.

Davenport Hatch Foundation awarded us a very generous grant covering over half the estimated total cost. The balance needed was identified from available on hand funds.

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After two rounds of bidding, including the need to upgrade our electrical capacity to handle air conditioning systems, the contract was awarded to VanHook Service, a commercial and industrial HVAC company headquartered in Rochester.

After waiting for delayed equipment delivery from factories, installation was begun in December. Two complete Unico systems have been installed, with one air handler in the lighthouse attic and one in the basement. Each system delivers cool air through a unique system of 24 high velocity, high efficiency flexible vents installed inconspicuously in floors and ceilings. Two 2-ton condensers were installed on the north side of the lighthouse, and two Wi Fi thermostats will allow remote monitoring and adjustment of temperatures from a cell phone or computer.

So next summer, be sure to visit the lighthouse and gift shop on a warm day and you will notice that it's a lot more comfortable inside. As you tour the interesting exhibits and learn more about the unique history of the Sodus Bay area, or browse thru the latest gift shop merchandise, hopefully you will think it's all "very cool".





## *Rooms of the Lighthouse – The Sill Room – Part 1*

### *Second in a Series on the Lighthouse Rooms*

*In the Fall 2021 issue of the SBHS Newsletter, Tom Lightfoot began a series about the exhibit rooms of the lighthouse. We wish to continue that series in the spirit Tom intended: to shed light on the history behind each room; the people whom the room is named in honor; and some information on the exhibits found in each room.*

Nearly everyone reading the SBHS newsletter is familiar with the name Sill: Sill Road; Sill's Shore; Sill's Farm; Sill's Marine Construction, Sill Landing, and Sill's Marina. In 1986, the Sodus Bay Lighthouse "Sill Room" was named to honor William "Bill" Louis Sill who passed away in 2008 at the young age of 55. Bill's passion for sailboat racing, boat building, and living on the water was something passed to him through many generations. Bill's father, grandfather, and great grandfather were true lovers of Sodus Bay and the many gifts the area provided. These men and their families gave a tremendous amount of love and countless contributions to the Sodus Bay community. To fully appreciate the historical significance of the Sill Room, let's look back at Bill's ancestors.

John Sill came from England to Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1637. John and his wife Johanna had two daughters, Elizabeth and Judith, and one son, Joseph. A military man, Captain Joseph Sill (1636-1696) and his first wife Jemima Belcher had four sons and two daughters in Cambridge. Following Jemima's death in 1675, Joseph moved to Lyme, Connecticut where he married Sarah Clark in 1676. They had two children - Joseph and Zechariah. It is from Joseph the New York State Sill story develops.

In 1706, Joseph (1677-1765) married Phebe Lord (1688-1774). Joseph and Phebe had twelve children. Two of the twelve offspring have Sodus Bay connections. Ninth born, Jabez Sill (1722-1790) was the father of Moses and Jabez Sill who managed a tavern during the 1790s for Captain Charles Williamson in Troupville (Sodus Point's early name). Moses and Jabez moved away from the Sodus Bay area in the early 1800s. Joseph and Phebe's youngest child, twelfth born, Elisha Sill would sire the family line to eventually wind up fostering five generations of Sills on Great Sodus Bay.

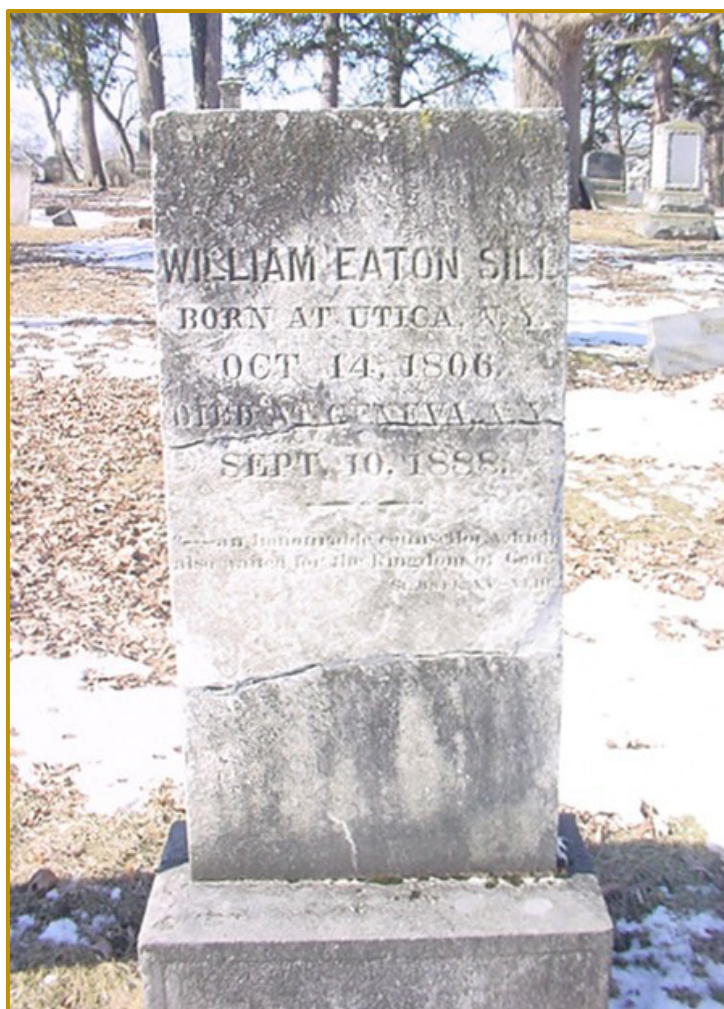
Dr. Elisha Sill (1730-1808) married Mary Heaton (1746-1816). Dr. Sill attended Yale Medical School, graduating in 1754. He began military service in 1771, serving as a surgeon

in General Oliver Wolcott's Connecticut Volunteer Brigade during the Revolutionary War. Elisha and Mary had four children, including Elisha Eaton Sill. Elisha Eaton dropped the "H" in his middle name given in honor of his mother's family.

Elisha Eaton Sill (1774-1812) settled in Utica where he was a merchant. He married Susan Miles Hopkins Dwight (1782-1860). They had three children, one of whom was Samuel Hopkins Sill (1812-1895), who in 1839, married Susan Ann Rose (1814-1848). Susan was the daughter of Robert Selden Rose and Jane Lawson Rose of Geneva for whom the Town of Rose is named, and who has a history of land ownership near Sodus Bay. Samuel and Susan had four sons. Elisha and Susan's second child, William Eaton Sill (1842-1898) became an attorney in Geneva, bought property and moved to Sodus Point. On January 2, 1867, William married Elizabeth Selden Mather (1848-1934) at her parents' home in Sodus Center.

Purchased from the Peregrine Fitzhugh estate, William Eaton Sill owned property along Sodus Bay's west shore between First and Second Creek. In an August 1, 1894, *Arcadian Weekly Gazette* article titled "A New Breathing Place" Sill christened this property "South Shore". William made extensive improvements to this farm tract, including roads, an icehouse, and a horse barn. He laid out lots for purchase and development, planted trees, and built a wall of riprap along the shore to protect the bluff from erosion.

On June 26, 1870, William and Elizabeth brought their first child into the world - Arthur Gavin Sill. Arthur had two siblings - Elisha and Katherine. Arthur would inherit the Sill farm and manage the property. When he wasn't engaged in farming pursuits or his law practice, one could find him racing one of his well-known sailboats in Yacht Club regattas on Sodus Bay. Arthur married Laura Adelle Stillman at Sodus Point in 1904.

They had two children, Stewart Stillman Sill (1906-1979) and Naomi Sill Taylor (1911-2007).

Stewart Sill Sr. married Dorothy Esther Arney in 1933. Stewart and Dorothy had two children - Stewart Stillman Sill Jr. (1935-2012) and Susanne Arney Sill (1936-1976). Dorothy died in 1936. Stewart remarried twice more over the years. With his third wife Jeanne, son, Steven Stewart Sill (1951-2010) was born. Sill Sr. was instrumental in the building of several



major bridges such as the Veterans Memorial Bridge in Rochester and the Thousand Island Bridge at the St. Lawrence Seaway. He operated tugboats on Sodus Bay for many years and was engaged in marine construction including work on the Sodus Bay channel lighthouse and piers. Son, Steve became involved in the marine construction business with his dad and took over the business remaining an active force in marine construction on Sodus Bay for many years.

Stewart Jr. - "Stew" - while growing up, worked with his dad in the marine construction business and as part of that business, drove the tugboats to turn the large coal boats around. In addition to his youth work detail on the bay, Stew raced sailboats, one of which, an R-boat, *Kathea II*, which he raised from the bottom of the bay, restored with a lot of elbow grease and determination, and raced her all over Lake Ontario. Stew loved the water and racing on the water - from sailboats to iceboats and antique power boats. In 1952, Stew Jr. married Dawn Yantz. They had one son - William Louis Sill, for whom the Sill room was dedicated July 4, 1986, and a daughter Charlene. Stew started Sill's Marina in 1954, and ran the business for 43 years, renting slips and doing engine and boat repairs. Sill's Marina was a family business at which both Dawn and Bill worked side by side with



Stew.<sup>1</sup> Charlene went on to follow a Sill practice of becoming an attorney, like her great grandfather, Arthur Gavin Sill, and her great-great grandfather, William Eaton Sill.

Back to the Sill Room. As the room was dedicated in 1986 in Bill's honor, the name on the plate over the door to the room carries generations of history. The Sodus Bay community is indeed incredibly honored that the Sill family decided to call this great bay home. Sodus Bay Lighthouse is honored to have a room named in honor of Bill and his amazing ancestors.

Many thanks to Bill's mom, Dawn Sill, for taking time to fill in the gaps, share photos and provide great conversation about her family. Much of the genealogical research for this article was from tracing the family lineage on Family Search, Ancestry, Find a Grave, and newspaper obituaries and articles.

### **Curatorial – Martha Lightfoot, Chair**

The Curatorial Committee welcomes Carol Sergeant. Carol brings experience from working with the Town of Sodus Historical Society archives and the Sodus Library. During the fall and winter months, the committee continues to organize and catalog items in the attic. At some point, we will enter the newly cataloged items into Past Perfect collections museum software. Some of the items we are cataloging include newspaper articles, photos, and artifacts that are on display in the museum.

Signage is an important component of the museum exhibits. Once the collection is more organized and entered appropriately in Past Perfect, we will design and expand the current signage on both floors to include interpretive panels. We are also working on an information binder to be used next summer for training docents and are compiling material for a self-guided tour of the lighthouse exhibits.

Continued coordination with Sodus Bay Lighthouse Buildings & Grounds is ongoing to repair holes in walls throughout the lighthouse left from the display changes last season, as well as other needed repair factors throughout the lighthouse.

Three blueprints for the Robin class sailboat, designed by retired naval architect, Benjamin B. Wood are currently being framed at Sherry’s Framing in Seneca Falls. They will be hung near the Robin display on the second floor in the boating room. The Robin was a special class sailboat designed by Wood, commissioned by the Sodus Bay Yacht Club, and especially formulated to the conditions for sailing on Sodus Bay.

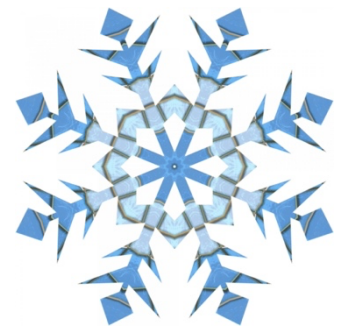
### **Lighthouse Museum Gift Shop – Mary Quinn & Sue Coco, Co-Chairs**

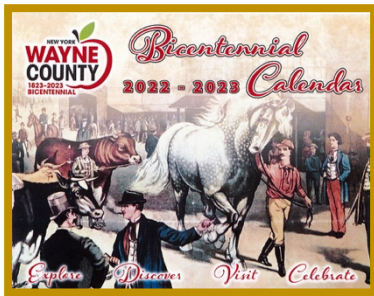

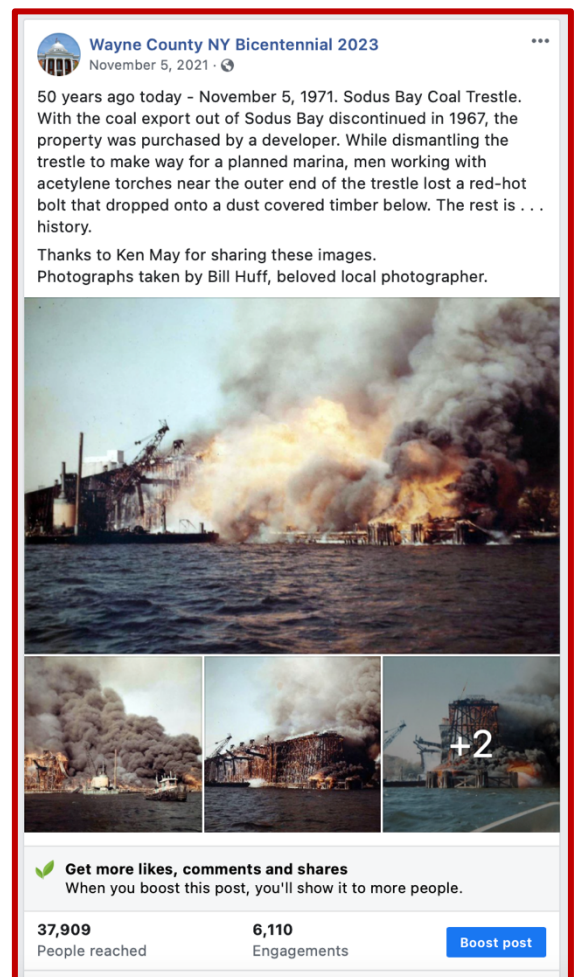
