# Sodus Bay Historical Society & Lighthouse Museum




#### TO TELL THE STORY OF SODUS BAY

#### WE DO THAT BY:

- **ACTIVELY MAINTAINING A MUSEUM WHERE** WE COLLECT, PRESERVE, AND EXHIBIT RECORDS, WRITINGS, HISTORICAL ITEMS, AND **ARTIFACTS**
- PRESERVING AND DISSEMINATING HISTORIC INFORMATION ABOUT THE SODUS BAY AREA
- MAINTAINING A HISTORIC LIGHTHOUSE.



Within 3-5 years, our work will have a strong regional focus, including Sodus Bay and the surrounding communities. Our educational activities will involve presentations, speakers, videos, and both group gatherings and opportunities for individual learning. We will serve both children and adults with both interactive and online education, as well as regularly-changing museum displays with helpful docents available. And, in addition to our historic lighthouse, we will feature a multi-use facility with revolving museum exhibits and a place for gatherings three seasons of the year, to support our educational and regional focus.



## Part III - Local Soldiers and Sailors Encampments Rosa Fox

Post-Civil War Local Reflections, Parts I and II, published in the Summer 2023 and Winter 2024 SBHS Newsletters, recognized General Gordon Granger, from the Sodus hamlet of Joy, who, on June 19, 1865, delivered General Order No. 3 to the people of Galveston, Texas, stating, "The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free." Following that event, which was essentially the end of the war, the Local Reflections series covered the establishment of the Grand Army of the Republic local activities through the beginnings of the Wayne County Soldiers' and Sailors' Association. As a reflection of the efforts to support Civil War veterans, this series, moves into the final segment, Part III - the work of the Wayne County Soldiers' and Sailors' – their encampments/reunions, their impact on local veterans, economy, and history of the area.

#### **First Wayne County Encampment**

During the 1870s, Wayne, Cayuga, and Seneca Counties presented what they called "Re-unions" [sic]. The tri-county group disbanded in August 1881, each county forming their own organization. The Wayne County Veteran Soldiers' and Sailors' Association held its first meeting August 12, 1881, electing a slate of officers and directors from across the county [see list at right]. "All old soldiers may become members of

the Association by the payment of one dollar to T. M. Brown, Sodus, who will issue certificates of membership." [Lake Shore News, 8/25/1881]

The first Wayne County Veteran Soldiers' and Sailors' Association (WCVSSA) Encampment was held August 22-25, 1882, at Driving Park in Lyons. The streets of Lyons were decorated in military fashion with flags everywhere and a large headquarter tent along with 40 other tents pitched at the encampment site. A dancing platform and bandstand were constructed. The musicians of Schuyler's brass band, a Lyons string band, and a Syracuse drum corps furnished music throughout the encampment. Reports of large crowds in Lyons – of as many as 5000 people – were on the grounds during the encampment. This first WCVSSA encampment, a great success, with speakers, mock battles between the "Rebs" and the "Yanks" and general good camaraderie went on to the wee hours of the morning and began a nearly 30-year tradition of summer gatherings for this group of veterans and their guests.

#### **Sodus Bay Encampments**

In 1883, the Soldiers' and Sailors' encampments moved to Sodus Bay. The railroad made travel to Sodus Bay much faster and easier. From 1883 through 1886, the encampments were held at Margaretta Grove. The encampments were held in other places in the eastern quadrant of Wayne County over the years [see list below]. The longest run for an encampment venue was Bonnie Castle. However, Bonnie Castle did not meet without resistance from veterans and others on the west side of Sodus Bay. When the WCVSSA decided to disband, an article titled **Encampments at Sodus Abandoned** appeared in the Wayne County Journal on April 18, 1912, providing a brief reflection on the thirty plus year history of the organization.

Originally, the idea was to hold a sort of campfire, and this was conducted in the old warehouse of E.H. Sentell at Sodus Point. The association grew to such large proportions that it was decided to hold weekly outdoor reunions. They were a success from the start.

[A]ttendance grew into the thousands. Sodus Bay was the liveliest part of the county for a week in August each year. Many of the best speakers and musicians that could be obtained were secured to entertain the large crowds. Hundreds of veterans came from other counties. Rochester was always well represented.

The article went on to reflect on the "dissatisfaction" of the facilities at Sodus Point, and a decision to move the encampment, trying several other venues — Lake Bluff, Port Bay, and Eagle Island — before landing on the east side of the bay at Bonnie Castle for a six year run between 1893 and 1898. But, as things go, the encampment on the east side of the bay was not convenient.

It was proposed the reunion be held on one side of the bay one year and on the other side the next year. This did not result in harmony, but finally led to the organization of the Empire Organization of Veterans and Sons of Veterans. Rival encampments were held the same week.

Bad weather affected both, and finally the veterans from both camps got together and decided to reunite, the younger organization giving up the ghost. The attendance at the Empire encampments was much larger than at the present organization reunions, owing to the fact that the programs were made more attractive and the newly constructed Rochester & Sodus Bay trolley ran within a short distance of the grounds.

The article concludes by relaying that by 1912, soldiers were passing away, many being in their late 60s

and 70s. There were only a few who were still active enough to organize the reunions. For that reason, and that there were other "amusements" drawing attention away from the encampments, the Wayne County Veteran Soldiers' and Sailors' Association disbanded in April 1912.

#### **Programs and Special Guest Speakers**

Soldiers' and Sailors' encampments provided a wide range of programing — educational and entertaining. Over the course of four days, which grew in duration over the years (by 1908 encampments were six days long), as well as attendance, there was something for all ages. There were plenty of reenactments of storming and capturing a fort and other acts of battle — the "Yanks" always winning. Instrumental and vocal music ensembles provided listening and dancing enjoyment. Each day included the veterans' vivid reminiscences well into the evening around campfires. Reunions of specific units were held at different times throughout the encampment. Grange and other organizations had the opportunity to present informative programs on a variety of subjects.

Having the encampment at the bay allowed for boating and other water recreation. "The large sidewheel steamer, "City of Rochester" and numerous sail and row boats were on hand and at the service of the crowd.... There must have been at least five or six thousand people on the grounds on each of the middle days of the encampment." [Lake Shore News, September 4, 1884] One wonders how many may have been in the bay or lake! Of note from this article is the fact that a total of eighty to ninety tents were raised for the encampment.

Effort was made to secure a variety of speakers, musical groups, and other performers. In July of 1887, Soldiers' & Sailors' President, Edward H. Sentell wrote a letter to Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross, requesting she speak to the attendees during the 1887 encampment. [see letter at right] "There is a great desire on the part of Old Comrades to see you and hear from you. Provision will be made for your Expenses Coming & Going & also while here be entertained. I should be pleased if you could give me one of the above dates, (or better if your time permits

to have you with us all the time)."

There is no record of Clara

attending the reunions of 1887 or 1888. Sentell must have written to Clara again in 1889, as a local newspapers reported that Clara would be speaking at the Women's Relief Corp meeting in the afternoon of Saturday, August 17, 1889.

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
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



She was still working at Johnstown, PA where a devastating May flood required her continued presence to oversee the Red Cross operations. Clara did send a letter to the attendees at the encampment, which was read during the meeting.


#### Memorabilia

Many people collect event ephemera – concerts, festivals, musicals, fairs, etc. This was true of the Soldiers' and Sailors' encampment/reunions. Programs, buttons/pins, and ribbons were commemorative items saved from these encampments. The Sodus Bay Lighthouse and Huron History Center have collections of some Soldiers' and Sailors' memorabilia. #### Conclusion

The Wayne County Soldiers' and Sailors' Association Encampments held on Sodus Bay from 1883 to 1910 brought many visitors to the area and provided a unique community, social, and cultural experience for attendees. The encampments also contributed to Sodus Bay becoming a major destination during that era through the present. As you go about the bay this season (and years to follow), think about those who were here before us. Consider their limitations in travel and resources. Then think about how their dedication, enthusiasm, and desire to share through the variety of activities helped create a community. Envision these hardy and brave ancestors dressed in their uniforms of blue, reveling in the August weather about Great Sodus Bay, reliving the wretched horrors of their war memories through re-enactments and sharing stories of the war – and surely some offering great tales of humor. All this from these soldiers and sailors in blue - giving tangible life and meaning to the word freedom.

#### Sodus Bay Channel Lighthouse Pier Catwalk.

A section of the old pier steel catwalk (built circa 1901) has been on display outdoors at the Sodus Bay Lighthouse Museum since the 1980s, after the catwalk was removed from the pier. This past May, United Way Day of Caring volunteers moved the catwalk to a new location on the north side of the museum – where one may view the channel pier and think about days gone by, when lighthouse keepers braved all the elements – including ice - to tend the lights! Note: The original wooden catwalk from 1870s was replaced several times due to storms and collisions of ships on the pier before the steel walk was constructed.
